Asian Heritage Month Lecture by Professor Henry Yu "Engaging with the Reality of Canada"

Henry Yu is an Associate Professor of History and the Principal of St. John's Graduate College at the University of British Columbia. He is the Principal Investigator for a \$1.17 million project entitled "Chinese Canadian Stories: Uncommon Histories from a Common Past," largely from the Community Historical Recognition Program of the Canadian federal government. He is a founding board member of the Chinese Canadian Historical Society of British Columbia.

He is the author of Thinking Orientals: Migration, Contact and Exoticism in Modern America (2001, Oxford University Press). He is working on three book projects: on Pacific Canada; on How Tiger Woods Lost His Stripes; and on the history of Chinese migration in the Pacific world.

Senator Vivienne Poy, the first Canadian of Asian descent to be appointed to the Senate of Canada, will speak about the past, present, and future of our Asian Canadian communities as we celebrate our many achievements over the past decade, and look forward to the challenges and opportunities that lie ahead.

An author, entrepreneur, historian, corporate director, fashion designer and community volunteer, Senator Vivienne Poy is the first Canadian of Asian descent to be appointed to the Senate of Canada. She is Chancellor Emerita of the University of Toronto, where she earned her Ph.D. in History. Senator Poy has advocated for the rights of visible minorities and women throughout her career, emphasizing the economic benefits of diversity. She was instrumental in having May recognized nationally as Asian Heritage Month by the Government of Canada to acknowledge the contributions of Asian Canadians. In addition to helping build bridges between Canadians, encouraging intercultural dialogue, Senator Poy continues to champion a greater understanding of the Asia-Pacific region. In recognition of her domestic and international influence, Senator Poy has received numerous honorary degrees from universities in Canada and around the world.

Biography of Alice Ping Yee Ho

Alice Ho is a Hong Kong-born Canadian composer acclaimed for her "distinctly individual" style and "organic flow of imagination." Considered "among the most important composers writing in this country" (D. Ariaratnam, *The Record*, Kitchener, ON), she has written in many musical genres and received numerous national and international awards, including the du Maurier Arts Ltd. Canadian Composers Competition, MACRO International Composition Competition, Luxembourg International Composition Prize, Hunter's Award for Best Classical Composer, and International League of Women Composers Competition.

Often performed at national and international new music festivals (ISCM World Music Days, Ottawa Chamber Fest, Demarks' CRUSH New Music Festival, Asian Music Week in Japan, etc.), her works have also been played by major ensembles and soloists including the China National Symphony, Shanghai Philharmonic Orchestra, Polish Radio Choir, Esprit Orchestra, the Toronto, Vancouver, Winnipeg, and Victoria Symphonies, Luxembourg Sinfonietta, Le Nouvel Ensemble Moderne, Penderecki String Quartet, New Music Concerts, percussionists Sumire Yoshihara and Beverley Johnston, violist Rivka Golani, and St. John's Duo Concertante. Her discography includes releases on the Centrediscs, Blue Griffin, Electra and Phoenix labels.

Ms. Ho holds a Bachelor of Music degree in composition with high distinction from Indiana University and a Master of Music degree in composition from the University of Toronto. As a noted classical pianist, Ms Ho had performed in many new music festivals, including a solo piano recital recorded by CBC Radio 2 in which she premiered Tan Dun's solo piano work "Traces II".

Biography of Professor Priscila Uppal

Dr. Priscila Uppal is a Toronto poet, fiction writer and York University professor. Among her publications are eight collections of poetry, most recently, *Ontological Necessities*

(2006; shortlisted for the \$50,000 Griffin Poetry Prize), *Traumatology* (2010), *Successful Tragedies: Poems* 1998-2010 (Bloodaxe Books, U.K.), and *Winter Sport: Poems*; the critically-acclaimed novels *The Divine Economy of Salvation* (2002) and *To Whom It May Concern* (2009); and the study *We Are What We Mourn: The Contemporary English-Canadian Elegy* (2009). Her work has been published internationally and translated into Croatian, Dutch, French, Greek, Italian, Korean and Latvian. She was the first-ever poet-in-residence for Canadian Athletes Now during the 2010 Vancouver Olympic and Paralympic games as well as the Roger's Cup Tennis Tournament in 2011. She will be resuming her position for the 2012 London Summer Olympics and Paralympics. Time Out London recently dubbed her "Canada's coolest poet." For more information visit priscilauppal.ca
