The presenters will also highlight specific exchange programs and networks that have proved to be successful. You will gain insights into how to develop these exchange programs, what are the possibilities, and how best to utilize them in ways that suit your school's resources and requirements.

Senator Vivienne Poy, Chancellor Emerita of University of Toronto, will be presiding at the event. The roundtable will be chaired by Professor Ruth Hayhoe, OISE, University of Toronto. The Asian Heritage Month Lecture will be given by Professor Lap-Chee Tsui, Vice-Chancellor and President of University of Hong Kong speaking on "The higher education scene in Hong Kong". Professor Ruth Hayhoe (OISE, University of Toronto) will give a Plenary Speech on "Hong Kong Education Reforms in a Global Context," focusing on the reform of HK's overall education system, initiated in 1997 and completed this year, with the implementation of four year university education. Professor Roopa DesaiTrilokekar (Education, York University) will speak on "The Contemporary Context of Indian Higher Education" and Professor Sheila Embleton (York University) will speak about "Opportunities and Challenges for Canada-India Educational Exchanges" The Discussant is Professor Wendy Wong Associate Chair, Design, Faculty of Fine Arts, York University.

## **Emily Cheung- Artistic Director/Choreographer**

Cheung is a professional Chinese dance artist specialized in both Chinese classical and contemporary styles. She received her dance training in China, United States, and Canada. With an active performing schedule, Emily has won many prestigious dance awards including three grand prizes from the North American Chinese Dance Competition for her excellent dance technique and interpretation. She is an educator, performer and choreographer with a B.F.A.

and B.Ed. and Master of Fine Arts (M.F.A.) in Dance from York University. Cheung is involved in preserving traditions, and collaborating with artists from other disciplines and ethnic backgrounds to create works with unique aesthetics sensibilities. She is also a guest lecturer for York University, University of Toronto and Trent University.

## William Lau- Peking Opera Artist

William Lau is a refined performer, dynamic educator, and distinguished cultural worker. A graduate from York University's Master of Fine Arts program in dance in 1991, William specialized in the arts of Nan Dan and Western classical ballet. Presently, William specialized in the arts of Nan Dan (male playing female roles in Peking Opera) under renowned Masters in China such as Shen Xiaomei, Song Changrong, and Sun Mingzhu. He had developed and promoted the richness of Chinese dance and opera to a wide range of audiences nationally across Canada as well as mentored a new generation of cultural workers. He had also performed internationally including United States of America, United Kingdom, China, Mexico, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and Indonesia. William always aims to bridge Chinese performing arts to the Canadian mainstream communities by conducting workshops and lecture demonstrations at various academic institutions and professional companies.

#### Keiko Kitano- Soloist

A "Masterful choreographer" (The Globe and Mail) Keiko Kitano is an independent dance artist with a unique style influenced by her study of Butoh and Japanese dance. A resident of Toronto since 2003, Keiko has collaborated with many local and international artists. She is a co-founder of Green Tea, holds a Master's degree Dance and shares her passion of dance art as a part-time faculty of York University.

#### Sashar Zarif- Choreographer

Sashar Zarif is an internationally renowned multi-disciplinary artist, educator and research in the field of dance ethnology and ethno musicology. His areas of interest are identity, globalization, cross-cultural collaborations, and Sufi-Shamanic Rituals. His research, artistic practice and education activities are based on the arts of Central and western Asia including

Azerbaijan, Iran, Afghananistan, Uzbekistan, Tajikistan, Georgia, and Chechnya. Sashar has collaborated with such renowned artists as Alim Quasimov and Rizwan-Muazzam Qawwali as well as many esteemed colleges at York University. He performed nationally and internationally with his company. Sashar artistic ambassador for diversity in arts; and a 2008 Dora Mavor Moore nomination for outstanding performance in is dance creation, Choreographies of Migration.

## **Jack Shi- Choreographer**

Jack specialized in Chinese classical dance. He graduated from the Beijing Dance Academy as a senior lecturer at the education department. How do you go on when everything you love is gone??

After the Asian tsunami sweeps away her family, Parvati finds herself in Canada, trying to navigate a new life while living in an unfamiliar culture, with distant relatives she had never met before. She finds work as a hotel chambermaid, but it is alien and dislocating until she begins a doomed love affair with a guest. As Parvati's new life begins to disintegrate, she finds one of her strongest anchors in Emily, a homeless young musician with whom she travels to Cape Breton to see the ocean once again.
